PLC CORNER

Is the "end" near?

Just when you think Halloween is over, now we hear scary readings this Sunday. Predictions of blazing destructive fire, conflicts between nations, wars, earthquakes, famine, plague, and awesome signs from the sky. Wow! That's terrifying - sounds like a catastrophic action movie.

All this is typical of visionary apocalyptic prophesies. We hear this in the first reading from the Prophet Malachi. Other books of the Bible have similar prophesies – like the Book of Daniel and the Book of Revelation. Also, in the readings this Sunday, we hear from the Gospel of Luke that Jesus told the people that awful events would come – including the destruction of the sacred Temple in Jerusalem.

Does the Church give us these readings to scare us into getting "right" with God before Jesus comes again? NO! The Church focuses on the "end times" now because we are coming to the end of Liturgical Year. Next week is the last Sunday in Ordinary Time – the solemnity of Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. Then the following Sunday starts the new Liturgical Year with the First Sunday of Advent.

So, the Church at the end of every Liturgical Year reminds us of the "end times". But again, NOT to scare us but to inspire us. In the Gospel, Jesus told his disciples not to be deceived by false prophets claiming to know the day and time of the end. He said they would suffer before those things happened, but to persevere and they would secure their lives. Jesus tells us also not to be anxious or scared about the end times, but in this meantime to persevere in our troubles and suffering with faith and care for one another.

This focus on the "end" leads nicely into Advent when we prepare for the Birth of the Savior – and at the same time we prepare for his Second Coming at the end of time.
